15 16 17 18 19 20 21	<b>Background:</b> The Council on Professional Issues reviewed ASDA's E-8 policy and agreed on modifications that would closer align the policy's language and structure with the American Dental Association's language and structure. This was achieved by providing a one-sentence definition of each category and separating the Nonmaleficence and Beneficence categories, and creating a separate category for Veracity. As a close partner to the American Dental Association, ASDA works to have aligned missions, positions and policies in order to present a unified voice within organized dentistry.
22 23 24 25	Additionally, two new lines specific to the dental student experience were added. The first is a line under the Beneficence section, encouraging a respectful and collaborative environment in education. The second is under the Veracity section, regarding conducting ethical research. Therefore, be it

27 28 29 30	<b>Resolved,</b> that the Current Statements of Position or Policy E-8 ASDA Student Code of Ethics be amended to read as follows:
31 32 33 34 35	The pathway to professional status is obtained through knowledge, skill, and experience with which students serve their patients and society. Every dentist should strive to continuously improve their knowledge of ethics in order to help achieve higher levels of patient care. These foundational ethical values will serve as a guideline throughout the dentist's career, from predoctoral student to fully credentialed professional.
36 37 38 39 40	The American Student Dental Association recognizes the importance of high ethical standards in the dental school setting. Therefore, the Association believes students should conduct themselves in a manner reflecting integrity and fairness in both the didactic and clinical learning environments. The code outlined below relates most directly to the dental school environment. To gain a more expansive understanding of ethics in practice, please see the ADA Code of Ethics.
41	The following is the ASDA Code of Ethics:
42 43 44 45	<ul> <li>I. Dental Student Conduct         <ul> <li>A. All dental students are obligated to maintain high standards of moral and ethical behavior and to conduct themselves in a professional manner at all times. This applies to the classroom, clinic, laboratory, and other institutional facilities; externships, community service, or</li> </ul> </li> </ul>

47		B. Ethical and professional behavior by dental students is characterized by honesty, compassion,
48		kindness, fairness, and integrity, fairness and charity in all professional circumstances;
49		respect for the rights, differences, and property of others; concern for the welfare of patients,
50		competence in the delivery of care, and preservation of confidentiality in all situations where
51		this is warranted.
52		C. All dental students are obligated to report unethical activity and violations of the honor code to
53		the appropriate body at the school.
54	١١.	Patient Autonomy ("self-governance"). The student dentist has a duty to respect the patient's rights
55		to self-determination and confidentiality.
56		A. Informed Consent and Refusal
57		1. Students should conduct a thorough discussion with every patient. This must be repeated
58		whenever there are substantive changes or additions to the treatment plan.
59		Discussion should include:
60		a. Diagnoses
61		b. Treatment Plan
62		c. Prognosis
63		d. Risks/Benefits
64		e. Alternatives
65		- The discussion should be in understandable terms and enable a reasonable patient
66		in the patient's position to make an informed decision regarding care, except in
67		emergencies, when risks are unknown, commonly known or the patient waives the
68		right of disclosure.
69		2. Students should inform the patient of the consequences of not accepting treatment. The
70		patient has a right to an informed refusal which should be honored by the student.
71		B. Patient Confidentiality
72		1. Should follow HIPAA Guidelines.
73	III.	Nonmaleficence ("do no harm") <del>and Beneficence ("do good")</del> . The student dentist has a duty to
74		refrain from harming the patient.
75		AThe student should conduct him/herself with veracity (truthfulness). He/she should always act
76		in a manner that promotes the welfare of patients and avoids harm to the patient.
77		B. Treatment plans should be determined according to patient needs as opposed to unmet
78		requirements of the student.
79		C. No procedures should be started without instructor authorization, and all procedures should be
80		evaluated by the instructor upon completion.
81		D. Referrals to residents, specialists, or staff members should be made when the complexity of the
82		case exceeds the student's ability to meet the standard of care. The referring student should
83		inform the patient who will be responsible for dental maintenance and the reason for
84		referral.
85		E. Students should exercise discretion in treating family members due to problems associated with
86		medical history disclosure, confidentiality, objectivity, and professionalism.
87		F. Students must never perform dental procedures while in an impaired condition, regardless of
88		the source of the impairment.
89		G. Students are encouraged to participate in community outreach programs in order to improve
90		the dental health of the public.
91		HStudents should advocate access to care for patients who are unable to receive care due to
92		physical or mental disability or financial hardship.
93	IV.	Beneficence ("do good"). The student dentist has a duty to promote the patient's welfare.
94		A. Students are encouraged to participate in community outreach programs in order to improve
95		the dental health of the public.

96	B. Students should advocate access to care for patients who are unable to receive care due to
97	physical or mental disability or financial hardship.
98	C. Student dentists will encourage an environment that supports respectful and collaborative
99	relationships for all those involved in oral health care and education.
100	V. Justice ('fairness"). The student dentist has a duty to treat people fairly.
101	A. Ethnicity, religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national origin, disability, gender identity or
102	infectious disease status should not influence whether or not a patient is accepted by a
103	student to receive care. Furthermore, all patients should be treated with the same level of
104	compassion, kindness and respect.
105	B. Students must not discriminate against patients in high risk behavior groups.
106 107	C. The student should not cheat, plagiarize, forge, or falsify official records, patient charts, or examinations.
108	DThe student should not participate in activities involving theft and/or vandalism of school or
109	student property.
110	E. Sexual harassment between colleagues, between health care provider and patient, and between
111	students and faculty or residents is unacceptable and must be reported.
112	F. Students must report suspected abuse/neglect of patients to an appropriate instructor.
113	G. Students should exercise respect when working with human cadavers.
114	HControlled substances
115	1. Students have the responsibility of protecting the integrity of the profession by
116	reporting any suspicions of unethical behavior.
117	2. Students must never perform dental procedures while in an impaired condition,
118	regardless of the source of the impairment.
119	VI. Veracity ("Truthfulness"). The student dentist has a duty to communicate truthfully.
120	A. The student should not cheat, plagiarize, forge, or falsify official records, patient charts, or
121	examinations.
122	B. The student should not participate in activities involving theft and/or vandalism of school or
123	student property.
124	C. The student will conduct research in an ethical manner and abide by all guidelines set by their
125	institution's Institutional Review Board.
126	D. Students have the responsibility of protecting the integrity of the profession by reporting any
127	suspicions of unethical behavior.
128	VII. All members of the American Student Dental Association must comply with the ASDA Code of Ethics.
